




CFS By Nature





MINUTES OF THE MAY 6, 2020 REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING BY TELECONFERENCE 411 TALLOWOOD DRIVE, EL LAGO, TEXAS 77586

1. **Call to Order** Mayor Skelton called the meeting to order at 7:01 PM.

2. **Declaration of a Quorum**

3. **Citizen Comments**

The following submitted citizen comments were read by City Secretary, Rachel Lewis:

Jeff Tave of 302 Pine View Circle – “1) Has the City been provided an investigation report of the April 2020 dog shooting event in Taylorcrest by LPD? If no, when is it expected that the investigation will be concluded and a report made available to the City? Once the investigation has been concluded with a report published, will there be a City Council agenda item where the investigation report will be discussed and the report made available to the citizenry? 2) Tennis Courts – Last Thursday, Gov Greg Abbott’s stay-at-home order expired which now allows outdoor sports to be played as long as it is limited to four participants. As such, why did the City not open the City’s tennis Courts on Friday, May 1st? The El Lago Men’s Tennis League uses the courts for their Tuesday night doubles session which complies with the Governor’s orders. a) Since those who are enrolled in the monthly payment option for Fitness Center memberships are not being charged due to the COVID-19 shutdown (and it appears all Councilmembers are now receiving their monthly \$50 City Council honorarium as cash instead of the waiving of fitness center fee for those that originally chose that option), will those people who paid for an annual tennis pass receive credit for the months the courts have been closed? If this has not been considered, please consider offering a credit toward next year’s renewal so that all fee-paying users of the city’s fitness facilities are treated fairly & consistently. 3) Check log – check # 11129 to Rocket AC for a fan motor (\$500) – which city building was involved? (if 98 Lakeshore wasn’t the system recently replaced last year). If 411 Tallowood, wasn’t this system refurbished within the last couple years (2017)? Why isn’t the itemized credit card receipt statement for item #11130 (Wells Fargo statement \$2153.48) attached? – please include it to provide transparency to Council & citizenry.”

Tiffany Bachner of 711 Crestwood Drive – “1) We moved into our house which contained no carbon monoxide detector and all smoke detector were installed incorrectly. That is why I suggest the city take charge and require all houses that are being sold to be inspected by the city for basic safety measures. It would be a great income for the city and ensure safety of the new owners. 2) We just removed two load bearing walls. Our contractor follow city guidelines and obtained a permit. Due to COVID 19 the inspection consisted of sending photos. However no photos were required during the work process. We are fortunate enough to have a good contractor but other might not be so lucky. Therefore, I believe the city inspector should request more photos during the renovation process such as electrical work.”

Sheila Brown of 1851 Raintree Circle – “Dear Mayor and City Council, how many temporary trailers will be visible to citizens with the Ed White Elementary School Renovations and for how long will we be looking at them? How big will the detention pond be and will it prevent flooding? I have not found out who witnessed the dog shoot incident

with Michael O'Brien on April 13 in Taylorcrest? If you or anyone knows details can you please contact me as my neighbors continue to ask me questions."

Mayor Skelton stated that he would not comment on the dog shooting incident as it is an ongoing investigation. He reported that the tennis courts were not reopened due to concerns with vandalism and staff not currently present on site. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon said that the intension is to suspend memberships until the facilities open and staff is looking at extending the other memberships that are not reoccurring during the following year. Mayor Skelton addressed the idea for city inspections for new homes stating that he liked the idea but would like more information before it is considered. Regarding the number of temporary buildings which will be located at Ed White Elementary during the construction project, the Mayor stated he is aware that there should only be one trailer visible, however this trailer will be present for several months. The check for \$500 in question was for a repair to the older unit at the 98 Lakeshore location. He also stated that an itemized Wells Fargo statement would be available for review by the public.

4. Consent Agenda City Official, Board, Commission, Committee, & City Service Report

- 4.1. *Check Detail for checks printed from April 23, 2020 through May 6, 2020*
- 4.2. *Minutes from the Council Meetings of March 4, 2020 and April 22, 2020.*

Councilperson Michalak made a motion to approve and there was a second by Councilperson Clark. The vote passed unanimously by a roll call vote.

5. City Official, Board, Commission, Committee, & City Service Report

- 5.1. *SVFD Monthly activity report* – Chief Andy Gutacker reported there were six calls in April. Three were medical calls, one was a downed cable line, and one was an unintentional call. The average response time was 3 minutes and 16 seconds. Chief Gutacker reported that the staff has plenty of PPE and they have responded to calls for COVID-19 patients. Lastly, he stated that the City Floodplain Administrator asked him to review plans for the Ed White Elementary renovation and he provided information as to his concerns regarding space on the property for fire trucks to respond as well as the need for greenspace to allow for a life flight helicopter.
- 5.2. *City Secretary Rachel Lewis to report on the current reported expenses to the state and FEMA for COVID-19.* City Secretary Lewis reported that 7 businesses have returned loss surveys totaling \$102,600 in losses. Tom Merchant has contacted 12 businesses regarding the need to complete the business loss surveys. The total reported for City losses was \$13,823 but did not yet include the money saved due to court cancellations and the payments not necessary for judges, bailiffs, and prosecutors.

6. Mayor's Report

- 6.1. *Mayor Skelton to report on the state of the City.* Mayor Skelton reported that Clear Creek ISD is working closely with the City's Floodplain Administrator to ensure that runoff is adequate for the renovation at Ed White Elementary. The City's Fire Marshall provided concerns that fire trucks would not be able to get around all sides of the building so they are looking to remedy this. The City is not yet ready to issue permits but should soon be ready to do so for the Ed White Elementary renovation project. The work is set to begin in about 3 weeks. The Mayor stated that plans are being developed to open City Hall, the gym, tennis courts, park restrooms, pool, and pavilion with some restrictions. This will be based upon the Governor's orders and phases. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon asked if a target date of June 1st could be considered to open the pool and Mayor Skelton stated that he would agree to this however these are dates could only be plans at this time. He further stated that openings will also be based upon the comfort levels of the City staff regarding these plans. Mayor Skelton reported that he has been in weekly contact with County Judge Hidalgo and 300 masks were provided by the County to El Lago for use by the staff.

7. Council member's Reports

- 7.1. *Mayor Pro Tem Vernon to report on the street and sidewalk repair schedule.* Mayor Pro Tem Vernon reported that the project located at Huntercrest and Crestwood is ongoing, however she received the quote for the repair and is waiting for a response from WCID 50 as to the amount they will pay.
- 7.2. *Councilperson Findley report*
 - 7.2.1. *El Lago Dorados Swim Schedule and plans for the upcoming season.* Councilperson Findley stated that the Clear Creek Swim League is trying to determine the readiness for each team to participate this season. He stated that the Dorados need information about when the City pool will be available. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon stated that the City is seeking lifeguards and they will need to be trained. City Secretary Lewis stated that there will be

restrictions on the occupancy allowed in the pool so that must also be determined. Once allowed to open the pool, the occupancy can only be at 25% until further notice.

7.2.2. *Update on Ed White Elementary remodel regarding the Floodplain Administrator review.* Councilperson Findley reported that the plans are moving along well. All plans are in process and CCISD is cooperating with changes that are required.

7.2.3. *Hazardous Waste Day for the City.* Due to COVID-19, communications have stopped regarding plans however it is inexpensive and possible, so he will continue to move forward to set a Hazardous Waste Day in the City.

8. Old Business

8.1. *Consider/Approve the Third Amended Congestion Mitigation Traffic Management Agreement between the Metropolitan Transit Authority of Harris County and the City of El Lago.* Mayor Pro Tem Vernon contacted METRO about the advantage to signing the agreement since there are currently 5 years remaining on the current agreement. She stated she did not hear back from the METRO attorney. She recommended that nothing be done on this agreement. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon made a motion to postpone indefinitely and a second was provided by Councilperson Michalak. The vote by roll call was unanimous to postpone.

8.2. *Consider/Approve request and agreement by Chris Hoffman to use the City tennis courts, Event Room, and pool for his summer tennis camps.* Mayor Pro Tem Vernon went over the proposed agreement. It included that both a Camp Director and Assistant Director must be older than 21 years of age. Leaders must accompany all groups and 10% of the net profit from the camp will go to the City. All City facilities must be left as they were found. She recommended that Mr. Hoffman be contacted to discuss the possibility of 5% of gross profit be agreed upon rather than 10% of the net profit since this is an easier way to figure costs. She stated that this isn't to increase the amount to the City but rather an easier way to account for the income. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon made a motion to approve the agreement with the exception of striking the reference to Exhibit B in item 2 and submitting the agreement to the City Attorney for review before presenting it to Mr. Hoffman. A second was provided by Councilperson Kuehnel. Mayor Pro Tem Vernon amended the motion to include that compensation be agreed upon by Chris Hoffman. Councilperson Clark seconded. The vote was unanimous to approve the amended motion by roll call. Mayor Skelton called for a vote on the original motion. The vote passed unanimously by roll call.

9. New Business

9.1. *Consider/Approve the 2nd quarter financial report for the City for FY2020.* Mayor Pro Tem Vernon went over the 2nd quarter financial report. The overall average was at 77% for incomes and 48% for expenses. There was no opposition to not voting to approve since this was an informational item for Council and no approval was necessary.

9.2. *Consider/Approve Ordinance 469 renewing the Mayor's local disaster declaration dated May 4, 2020, for a period of seven additional days.* Mayor Pro Tem Vernon made a motion to approve and there was a second by Councilperson Clark. The motion passed unanimously by roll call.



Customer may (a) terminate this Agreement; (b) accept Bullion Coatings' estimate for sub-deck installation and immediately tender payment for same; or (c) install a compatible sub-deck within a reasonable time specified by Bullion Coatings. Should this Agreement involve anti-slip materials, please be advised that such finished surfaces will be slip resistant for a period of time that is dependent on factors such as traffic patterns, care and maintenance, weather, sun and shade exposure. Bullion Coatings disclaims any warranty or representation that the anti-slip products results in a surface that is "slip proof". Further, should this Agreement involve mold/mildew resistant materials or fungicides, please be advised that such finished surfaces will be mold/mildew resistant for a period of time that is dependent on factors such as traffic patterns, care and maintenance, weather, sun and shade exposure. Bullion Coatings disclaims any warranty or representation that the mold/mildew material results in a surface that is "mold/mildew proof".

7. DAMAGE TO WORK. In the event work already performed by Bullion Coatings is damaged by any cause beyond Bullion Coatings' control and Customer elects to cancel the work or the work is ordered terminated by public authority, Bullion Coatings shall still be paid for the work completed in the amount agreed to in writing for such work, or if not so agreed, Bullion Coatings' costs for such labor and materials plus 20% of such costs. If the work is not cancelled or ordered terminated, all work necessary to replace work already performed shall be considered additional work to be paid for by the Customer in accordance with the preceding sentence. 8. ARBITRATION. Each party has had the opportunity to consult their attorney regarding their rights under binding arbitration and has agreed to submit themselves and any claim that they may have to that process and recognize and affirm that an award under binding arbitration will be fully enforceable and may be submitted to a court and converted into a final judgment or order of that court. Each party agrees to be bound by and for the claims to be submitted through the American Arbitration Association pursuant to its rules and regulations as published by that Association.

9. CONFIDENTIALITY. In the event of any conflicts, claims, actions, proceedings, causes of action or disputes amongst the parties, Customer agrees that this Agreement is confidential and that Customer shall not disclose any information regarding the terms hereof, performance hereunder, or the nature of such conflicts, claims, actions, proceedings, causes of action or disputes to any third parties without Bullion Coatings' written consent. As used herein "disclose" includes, without limitation, any statements, messages, comments, or opinions, whether oral, written or electronic (including but not limited to, web posts, blog posts message-board posts, or similar types of postings on the internet) that in any way relate or refer to Bullion Coatings or the terms of this Agreement. The foregoing confidentiality shall not preclude Customer from disclosure to attorneys, prospective lenders, consultants, or accountants as may be required in connection with the transactions contemplated hereby. Customer acknowledges that any breach of this provision will result in irreparable and continuing damage to Bullion Coatings and, therefore, in addition to any other remedy which may be afforded by law, any breach or threatened breach of this provision may be prohibited by restraining order and/or injunction or any other equitable remedies of any court of competent jurisdiction. The rights, remedies and benefits herein expressly specified are cumulative and not exclusive of any right, remedies or benefits which either party may otherwise have by contract or by law.

10. MISCELLANEOUS.

a. Assignability. Bullion Coatings may assign or subcontract all or any part of the work to be performed under this Agreement. In the event of an assignment or subcontract, the assignee or subcontractor shall comply with the terms of this Agreement. Any work done by an assignee or subcontractor shall be warranted by the assignee or subcontractor as required hereunder. Customer agrees to look solely to the assignee or subcontractor in such case for any warranty claim arising from such work.

b. Renegotiation. In the Work under this Agreement has not begun on the Property within sixty (60) days from the execution of this Agreement by Customer, and Bullion Coatings has elected not to terminate the Agreement, Bullion Coatings has the exclusive right to re-negotiate, in good faith, the costs associated with completing the improvements. Should Customer not agree to re-negotiate the Agreement or the new costs provided by Bullion Coatings, then Bullion Coatings may unilaterally terminate the Agreement without any liability to Customer.

c. Default/Attorney's Fees. g. Construction. The language used in the Agreement will be deemed to be the language chosen by the parties to express their mutual intent, and no rule of strict construction shall be applied against any party. Any reference to any federal, state, local or foreign statute or law shall be deemed also to refer to all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, unless the context requires otherwise. The parties intend that each representation, warranty and covenant contained herein shall have independent significance. If any party has breached any representation, warranty or covenant contained herein in any respect, the fact that there exists another representation, warranty or covenant relating to the same subject matter (regardless of the relative levels of specificity) which the party has not breached shall not detract from or mitigate the fact that the party is in breach of the first representation, warranty or covenant.

h. Entire Agreement. The parties hereto expressly acknowledge that the Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties concerning the subject matter hereof and that unless otherwise provided in the Agreement, any other agreements or to such matters are hereby superseded and revoked. Further, Customer specifically acknowledges that there were no other verbal representations or agreements made to them by Bullion Coatings and/or any agent, representative or employee of Bullion Coatings that is not included in this Agreement. Customer is relying solely on the terms of this Agreement. Note, the headings in the Agreement are inserted for convenience only and are not a part of the Agreement.

i. Amendment. The Agreement shall not be modified or amended except by means of a written document signed by all parties. Any written modification shall be in the form of a change order. In the event Bullion Coatings fails to acquire an executed change order from Customer for any modification or amendment to this Agreement, Customer shall still remain responsible for the costs of any and all modification or amendments performed by Bullion Coatings.

6.2 JURISDICTION PROFILE

6.2.1 Location

The City of El Lago, Texas is in the southeast part of Harris County. The current boundaries generally extend from Taylor Lake on the west to the City of Seabrook on the east, and from Clear Lake on the south to Seabrook on the north. According to the United States Census Bureau, the city encompasses an area of 0.7 square miles (0.6 square miles of land and 0.1 square miles of water).

City emergency services are provided under contract by the Lakeview Police Department, Seabrook Volunteer Fire Department and the Nassau Bay Emergency Medical Service. Water and sewer services are provided by Water Control and Improvement District #50 (WCID 50).

6.2.2 History

The City of El Lago was incorporated in March of 1961 as a Type-A-General Law city operation under a Mayor-City Council form of government. Residential growth was largely due to the aerospace industry, where many astronauts resided. The growth occurred in four sections and now includes an estimated population of 2700, with approximately 1100 single family dwellings, some duplexes and apartment buildings. Within the city limits there are several small businesses mostly retail and food, one boat yard, two elementary schools and one assisted living center.

6.2.3 Climate

The climate of the City of El Lago is typical of southeast Texas, hot humid summers with cool and wet winters. Freezing weather can occur. Average annual rain fall is 45". Prevailing winds are from the southeast.

6.2.4 Governing Body Format

The City of El Lago is governed by a Mayor and five-member City Council (all of which are part time volunteers). City employees include a City Secretary, City Clerk, Court Administrator, and Maintenance Director and an additional maintenance employee.

The Mayor and City Council assumes responsibility for the adoption of this plan; The Mayor and City Council also will oversee its implementation. Development of this annex was carried out by the members of the local mitigation planning team, whose members are listed in Table 6-1.

6.3 CURRENT TRENDS

6.3.1 Population

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the population of the city of El Lago as of December of 2016 was 2,751. Since 1970, the population has grown at an average annual rate of 1.7%. Between those years the population in 1980 had grown by 35.6%, in 1990 an additional 4.5% with declines of 5.9% in 2000 and 12.0% 2010. This last decline can be attributed to the demolition of the Landing Condos, which were heavily damaged by Hurricane Ike.

6.3.2 Development

There is minimal anticipated residential development due to the City’s residential space being 99+% already built out. A low to moderate increase in commercial development is expected with a few commercial properties available for new construction. Table 6-2 summarizes development trends in the performance period since the preparation of the previous hazard mitigation plan, as well as expected future development trends.

6.4 CAPABILITY ASSESSMENT

The City of El Lago, Texas has performed an assessment of its existing capabilities for implementing hazard mitigation strategies. The introduction at the beginning of this volume of the hazard mitigation plan describes the components included in the capability assessment and their significance for hazard mitigation planning. This section summarizes the following findings of the assessment:

- An assessment of legal and regulatory capabilities is presented in Table 6-3.
- Development and permitting capabilities are presented in Table 6-4.
- An assessment of fiscal capabilities is presented in Table 6-5.
- An assessment of administrative and technical capabilities is presented in Table 6-6.
- An assessment of education and outreach capabilities is presented in Table 6-7.
- Information on National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) compliance is presented in Table 6-8.
- Classifications under various community mitigation programs are presented in Table 6-9.
- The community’s adaptive capacity for the impacts of climate change is presented in Table 6-10.

Findings of the capability assessment were reviewed to identify opportunities to expand, initiate or integrate capabilities to further hazard mitigation goals and objectives. Where such opportunities were identified and determined to be feasible, they are included in the action plan. The “Analysis of Mitigation Actions” table included in the action plan for this annex identifies these as community capacity building mitigation actions.

- School access: All ingress/egress to the public and charter schools is cut-off by significant street flooding during any heavy rains.

Mitigation actions addressing these issues were prioritized for consideration in the action plan presented in this annex.

6.11 REVIEW AND INCORPORATION OF INFORMATION FOR THIS ANNEX

6.11.1 Existing Reports, Plans, Regulatory Tools and Other Resources

The following technical reports, plans, and regulatory mechanisms were reviewed to provide information for this annex.

- **The City of El Lago, Texas Municipal Code** — The municipal code was reviewed for the full capability assessment and for identifying opportunities for action plan integration.
- **The City of El Lago, Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance** — The flood damage prevention ordinance was reviewed for compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program.

The following outside resources and references were reviewed:

- **Hazard Mitigation Plan Annex Development Toolkit** — The toolkit was used to support the identification of past hazard events and noted vulnerabilities, the risk ranking, and the development of the mitigation action plan.

6.11.2 Staff and Local Stakeholder Involvement in Annex Development

This annex was developed over the course of several months with input from the city's Emergency Management Committee, City Secretary, City Council representative, Floodplain Administrator, CERT Team Coordinator, Special Needs Coordinator and local Mitigation Planning Team members. All persons were asked to contribute to the annex development through reviewing and contributing to the capability assessment, reporting on the status of previously identified actions, and participating in action identification and prioritization. An action development meeting was held on multiple dates from February through August 2019 and was attended by representatives from previously listed groups. Once actions had been identified and compiled in the annex, a draft was internally circulated for comment.







PROPOSED FEE SCHEDULE AS OF MAY 20, 2020

Why propose a change to the Community Center pricing?

To simplify the bookkeeping that goes along with the Community Center memberships. All membership information is tracked manually, but the auditors require that the membership sales revenue be put into a liability account and then each month the accumulated month's supposed income is transferred into the appropriate income accounts. They say this is done so that income is realized as the services are used. There are a couple of factors that create an issue with the manual tracking that be done.

1) The memberships are sold in varying blocks of single, 6 month and 1 year terms, but City staff must break it down into single months. However, the "block" prices are in some cases not evenly divisible so we are spending time and energy tracking and reconciling pennies. Additionally, Senior discounts are 20% less and non-resident fees are an additional 40%. Again, this creates all kinds of percentages of dollars to track...it becomes nightmareish.

2) The gym recurring payment includes the credit card convenience fee, but the full memberships do not. Therefore, we must also track separately the 4% convenience fees on top of all the recurring full memberships, which seldom divide evenly into a monthly rate.

I am proposing fixed MONTHLY rates for all scenarios of memberships which are even dollars so no more uneven division by the months purchased or pennies to account for when applying discounts or fees. The proposed edited rates below (highlighted green for decrease and pink for increase) would net the city approximately \$413 per year.
